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## PURPOSE

The Grinnell Institute of International Relations is designed to bring together, on a non-partisan basis, leaders in thought and action who have due regard for truth as the basis of their opinions, to discuss problems of worldwide significance with a view to creating a better informed public opinion on questions of international import. It is also intended to provide suggestions how information can be disseminated and attitudes built in a sympathetic and constructive manner.

To this end it invites the participation of all persons who are interested in more favorable international relations and the removal of obstacles to world peace.

A part of the value of the institute arises from a free, democratic exchange of ideas between the faculty and those attending the institute, also in the leisurely, personal visits with lecturers. In order that these benefits may be preserved the attendance is limited to about two hundred.

### JULIEN BRYAN

### THE HUMAN SIDE OF ASIA

Mr. Bryan is an artist with a camera. His unusual ability has been secured that he may bring the Asiatic people and their customs to us in picture form. You will sit in a comfortable theater seat and see the Russian people and their country pass before you; you will see the Russian army and many other phases of Russian life; you will also journey to Manchoukuo where Chinese, Japanese, and Manchurians are trying to get on together; Japan will be there to help them with their industries, etc.!! But Mr. Bryan can show you these things better than they can be described.

### DR. GROVER CLARK

### THE CHANGING ORIENT

Having been reared in Japan and having taught in a Chinese university and edited a newspaper in China for many years, Grover Clark is probably the best informed person on oriental affairs. He will trace for us the struggle between China and Japan, also Russia and Japan; the significance of the supremacy of Japan in the orient, and the spread of communism in China; the political and commercial relations of the orient with the occident. **DR. T. W. SCHULTZ****AGRICULTURE AND WORLD PEACE**

Agriculture still awaits adjustment. Midwest agriculture remains unbalanced, with farmers in a vulnerable position. The demand pattern for farm products notably changed; the impact of vanishing markets; undervaluation of the American dollar in the international financial accounts of the U. S.; world markets and the prospective accumulation of farm surpluses; trade agreements; the new soil conservation program as a corrective for unbalanced production in the midwest; farmers' stake in world markets; ability of corn belt agriculture to absorb economic shocks during the next five to ten years . . . .

These critical issues affecting the welfare of millions of people in the central states will have the careful attention of Dr. T. W. Schultz of Iowa State college, Ames. We will never know the full effects of war until we know what war does to agriculture.

**HARRY E. TERRELL****ADULT PEACE EDUCATION**

As a practical peace educator, Harry Terrell is unsurpassed in the middle-west. For many years he has helped local groups set up peace programs. He understands the issues involved in the struggle for peace, and he knows the most practical approach to those issues. Mr. Terrell's wide experience, his study of the problems of peace, and his travel have all combined to fit him especially for helping those who wish to carry on peace education among adult groups. He will speak more directly to those who are interested in club programs.

**DR. WALTER VAN KIRK****CAN WE STAY OUT OF WAR?**

Dr. Van Kirk will devote most of his time to a discussion of the forces and movements which have as their objective the preventing of war. He is an excellent student of world peace organization and American foreign policy. His lectures will include the present status of the League of Nations, the more important peace treaties, American peace legislation, and American neutrality. As director of the National Peace Conference he is in a position to have all of the available facts bearing upon these subjects.

**DR. J. EMLYN WILLIAMS****EUROPE TODAY**

The people of the world have been going through the harrowing experience of feeling that their destiny is being determined by a few strong-willed groups in various parts of the earth. Just now our anxiety centers in Germany. As Germany goes, so goes the rest of us, is a common feeling just now. Dr. Williams is coming directly from Germany to the institute to tell us which way Germany is going. As the European correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor he has become known the world over as an intelligent, accurate, reliable writer. In six days at this institute he will give a full statement of: why Germany rearmed; why Germans tolerate Hitler; why Germany has violated the Versailles treaty and the Locarno pact; Germany's attitude toward the colonies, and similar questions affecting the rest of the world.
